# Learnings and Tips from FIT's Community of Practice 

## Inclusive development through community-based initiatives

The following insights are the result of a November 2022 FIT Community of Practice session where local partners CAP-Youth Empowerment Institute Kenya (CAP-YEI) and Làyidu-mètre discussed the solutions they are testing with Canadian SMOs Humber Institute of Technology \& Advanced Learning (Humber) and Journalists for Human Rights (JHR) respectively.

## 1 Work within, rather than pushing against, local contexts

JHR and their partner, Làyidu-mètre, sought local buy-in with media, government and CSOs while testing ways to prioritize sexual and reproductive health rights (SRHR) on the public agenda in Mali.

## 2 <br> Address gender equality as a community - engaging all genders <br> To help address existing socio-cultural barriers Humber and their partner, CAP-YEI, pivoted to enlist men

 as champions of change.Use creativity to address challenges and empower participants
Through creative arts approaches, both Humber College in partnership with CAP-YEI and JHR in partnership with Làyidu-mètre engaged participants in livelihood and advocacy opportunities. These included content creation for social media highlight talents such as photography and performing arts (CAP-YEI), and slam poetry (Làyidu-mètre ).

Vary testing approaches between regional contexts
JHR and Làyidu-mètre considered differences in healthcare access between rural and urban contexts in Mali. Similarly, CAP-YEI noted differences between refugees' access to services in urban or rural Kenya.

Boost participants' growth and success through mentorship In Kenya, CAP-YEI and Humber helped strengthen refugees' entrepreneurship endeavours by connecting them with people who have worked within the digital space who could offer support.
